He earned world-wide fame and a leading English mathematician sent a letter to the St. Petersburg university, congratulating them on their good fortune to have so great a scholar, whose name would redound through all ages and whose invention brought happiness and benefit to humanity. [26] Yet, with all his superior education and renown, he remained faithful to his people and his G—d, and was an outstanding example of high ethical conduct and noble character— his behavior remaining an eternal tribute to his memory.

Otzar Hasifrut, III, p. 67, carried an article by him in which he gave an explanation, based on astronomy, of the Talmudic dictum: "A harp was suspended above David's bed" (Berachot 2a). He was still single when he contracted smallpox and died at the age of thirty in 1867.
